

Rehabilitation and Reconstruction of Historic Districts and Preservation of Architectural Heritage after Armed Conflicts

The kick-off webinar is the starting event of a two-year university cooperation project between BTU Cottbus-Senftenberg and the American University of Beirut. This project aims at contributing to the rehabilitation and reconstruction of the historic districts of Syria and preservation of its architectural heritage that have been severely damaged and continue to suffer due to the recent crisis. For this purpose and built on the knowledge and experience of the cooperation partners on rehabilitation and reconstruction of war-damaged or neglected and dilapidated old cities in Germany, Lebanon as well as in Syria and other countries in the Middle East, the focus is made on capacity building and promotion of young Syrian academics and professionals in the field.

The project does not intend to merely transfer the essential knowledge, but also to search for integrative and context-based methods for the specific situations in Syrian cities together with the cooperation partners, participants and the stakeholders from Syria. Conceptual approaches for new challenges, such as climate adaptations within the historic cities will also be taken into account. The assessment of specific pre- and postconflict circumstances of each city that have enjoyed diverse and rich urban heritage for centuries and now are facing overwhelming series of complications, such as heavy destructions, economic decline, social tension and environmental crisis, shall come into play within the process of developing new approaches.

The kick-off event of this project consists of a two-day webinar and discussions for introducing the overall programme, sharing the pertinent experiences and practices by skilled professionals, building a base knowledge on the challenges of dealing with the war-torn Syrian cities and finally the selection of possible case studies for the forthcoming workshops. This event will be followed with block courses, workshops, training colloquia and the exchange of students during the period of 2021 and 2022 which will be announced accordingly.
