'Culture' in Authoritarian Transformations: Policies, Institutions, and Strategies of Resistance

International Workshop for cultural practitioners, artists, and scholars to reflect on the role of culture in the face of illiberal and authoritarian dynamics

6-8 October 2025

Brandenburg University of Technology, Cottbus (Germany)

Across Europe, illiberal, authoritarian, and right-wing movements are increasingly shaping the direction of cultural policy and redefining the frameworks in which cultural actors operate. In several countries democratically elected governments use their formal legitimacy to undermine the very foundations of cultural life in an open society. Through legal reforms, political appointments, or shifts in funding priorities they erode media pluralism, curtail institutional autonomy, and restrict the space for critical discourse.

In other contexts, it is right-wing grassroots movements or opposition parties that - with growing success - shape public debate, thereby narrowing the conditions under which cultural expression and engagement can take place. In both cases, cultural infrastructures - museums, theatres, festivals, initiatives, and more - have become key arenas in broader struggles over power, democracy, and cultural hegemony.

This international workshop invites 30 participants - working in the arts, museums, cultural institutions, civic initiatives, foundations, or academia - to reflect collectively on these developments. Drawing on concrete case studies from Poland, Hungary, Slovakia, Serbia, Italy, and Germany, we will explore the following questions

- Why do authoritarian and illiberal governments and movements place such importance on cultural policy and the cultural field?
- How do these developments reshape the room for manoeuvre available to cultural practitioners and institutions?
- What coping strategies and practices of resistance have emerged and which have proven effective - in keeping spaces for critical debate and cultural production open?

The programme will combine panel discussions, collegial exchange and joint reflection, as well as visits to local initiatives. It also aims to initiate a transnational network of mutual support and critical engagement among cultural actors facing increasing authoritarian pressure.

The event is jointly organised by the Chair of Cultural Management at Brandenburg University of Technology Cottbus-Senftenberg and the Project Group Central, Eastern, and Southeastern Europe at the German Federal Agency for Civic Education (bpb).

Cultural Initiatives and Civil Society under Right-Wing-Pressure – The Case of Cottbus

Losmachen – Association for the Strengthening of Civil Society in Lusatia is a civic initiative founded in February 2024.
